As there are no restaurants near the park, please bring your own lunch and beverage of your choice. The Society will provide bottled water.

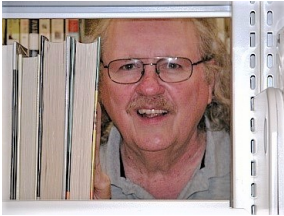

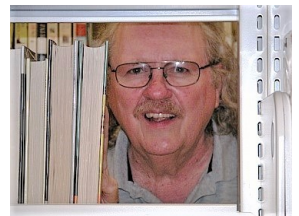

Whipkey's Word

Procrastinate



September has arrived with a sizzle. Hopefully near the end of the month, we'll see a cold (cool) front blow into the Houston area. That should moderate the temperature a bit. I have many tasks to do and I don't much care for working in the heat.

When I started writing this article back on August 8th, I was having trouble deciding on an appropriate word. There was always something that got in the way of me finishing my article. I am sure that many of you have seen the commercial on TV plugging the \$9.95 life insurance policy. I am going to borrow a phrase from them. I shoulda finished my article, but... I woulda finished my article, but... I coulda finished my article, but... Much to my editor's consternation it is September 6th, and I have not finished my article. Some may argue that **procrastination** is not a horticultural term, but I think it is. Let's make **procrastination** September's Word of the Month.

Google's English dictionary provided by Oxford Languages (<https://languages.oup.com/google-dictionary-en/>) defines **procrastination** as the action of delaying or postponing something.

Sounds exactly like what I did.

Have you ever been a **procrastinator**? I bet most of you have at one time or another. I am somewhat ashamed to admit that I have always been a procrastinator. Sometimes I got away with it, and sometimes it came back to bite me.

Don't **procrastinate**; promptly take care of these tasks.

- Watch the weather this time of the year it can change rapidly. We are still in hurricane season. Ike hit 9/13/2008. Things should calm down in October
- Keep an eye on your plants. They can dry out fast in September's hot weather.
- Get ready to move tender plants to a more protected location. I usually start covering our greenhouses in late September or early October. I try to have the tender plants moved inside by mid October.
- Pot up the last of those pups; it takes about 30-45 days for them to start setting roots. Unrooted pups can easily rot in our cool dreary winter weather.
- Check your plants carefully for insects and disease. You want to have clean, healthy plants to bring inside. Don't give scale and mealy bugs a free ride into your wintering areas. Both can spread rapidly when plants are in close quarters.
- Be sure to replace or repair that broken door, wobbly plant stand, or worn fan belt.
- Watch for toads, snakes, and other small critters making their home in your large *Aechmeas*. Some might make lovely pets, but others won't.

Even if you are busy, once the weather cools a bit, take a little time to sit down and admire your plants. Those other tasks can wait a while. Sometimes it is good to **procrastinate**.

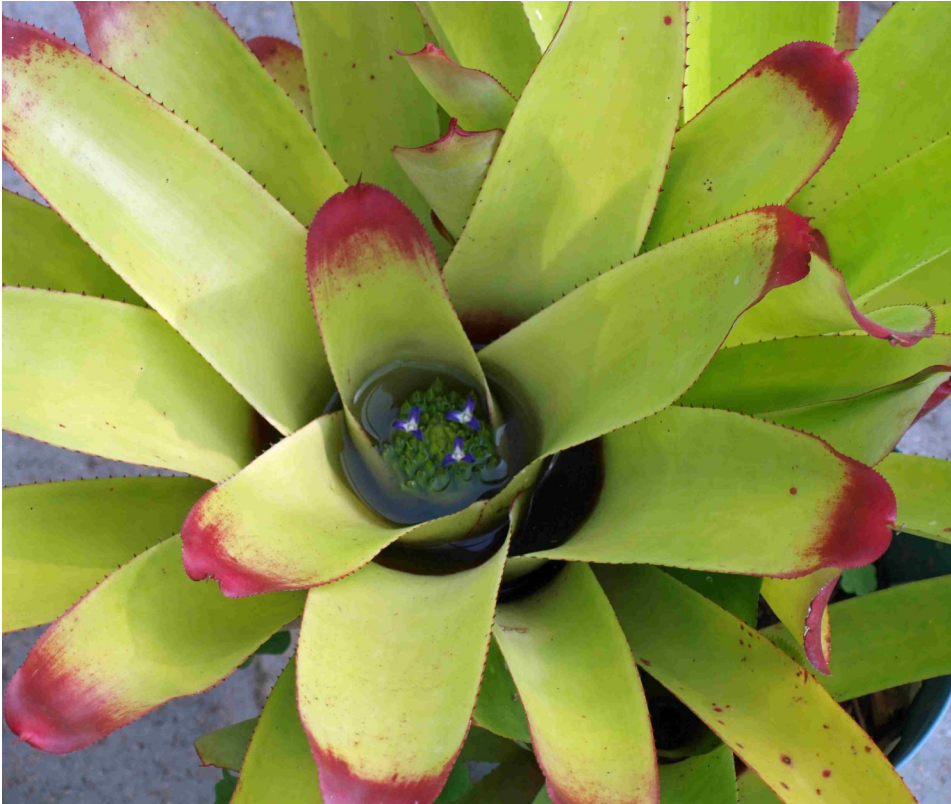

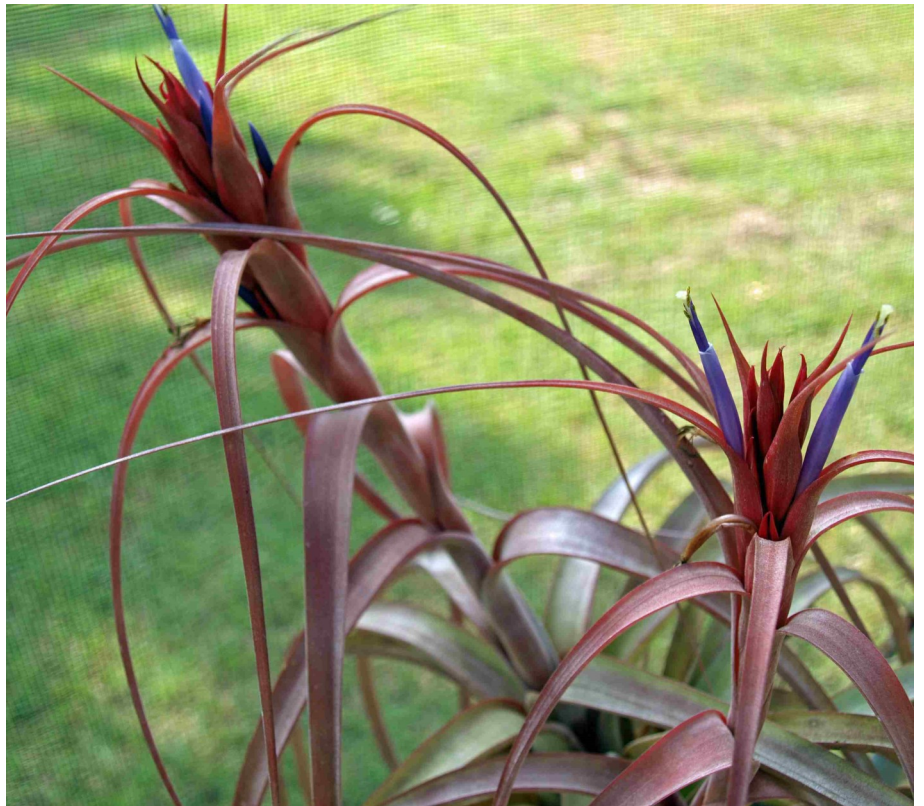
