## Charlie Birdsong speaking on:

## "20th Australasian Bromeliad Conference"

I developed my interest in Bromeliads from my parents in the late 1960's in New Orleans. I moved away from the plants to Baton Rouge in 1963 to attend LSU and have lived there ever since. After college I started my collection with Mulford Foster plants my parents and I had been given by Erik Knoblock. I brought my small collection to Baton Rouge and moved them in and out when the cold weather came.

In 1975 we started the Bromeliad Society of Baton Rouge. As a charter member I have served in

every office over the years and still serve the Society today as President. I also serve as the Vice-president of the Southwest Bromeliad Guild. I co-chaired the Southwest Guild and Cryptanthus Show in Baton Rouge in 2009 and I also chaired the 2018 Southwest Guild Show also in Baton Rouge.

In 1975 I also joined the BSI. I have attended many World Conferences and have chaired the auction at five Conferences. I have been serving as the Chairman of the BSI Affiliate Shows Committee since January 2010 and I m a past BSI Director for the Central District.

After years of trying to get a judging school in New Orleans, I joined the school in Houston. I am now a Master Judge and have judged well over 100 Shows since accreditation in 1996. I serve the BSI on the Judges Handbook revision committee through the Judges Certification Committee from our District. I have the pleasure of working closely with the Judges in Australia.

I have had many opportunities to speak about my favorite plants at local Garden Societies and other plant groups and Bromeliad Societies throughout Louisiana, Texas, Florida and even Australia. I have also written articles for the BSI Journal and Local Society Plant bulletins. I have contributed a number of short articles for the Greater New Orleans Bromeliad Society bulletin *Potpourri*.

I grow many Genera and although *Billbergias* are favorites, most of my over five thousand plants are *Neoregelias*. I am fortunate to have daughters living in Florida. Under the excuse of a Grandpa visit I have been able to make many trips to see Society Shows and visit vendors every year and should continue in the future.



# Whipkey's Word March 2021 *Triage*



I think I'm on a roll this year. In January I talked about pests. In February I discussed diseases. I had planned on choosing a more cheerful word for March, but early on 02/16/2021 it was 10° F in the back yard, there was no electricity at the Whipkey house for about 40 hours, inside the greenhouses it was 22° F, and there was massive damage to many plants. Sorry, but it looks like another disheartening "Whipkey's Word" for the month for March. Let's give the word **triage** a whirl.

According to Definitions from Oxford Languages (<a href="https://languages.oup.com/google-dictionary-en/">https://languages.oup.com/google-dictionary-en/</a>) **Triage** is defined as:

(in medical use) the assignment of degrees of urgency to wounds or illnesses to decide the order of treatment of a large number of patients or casualties.

verb

assign degrees of urgency to (wounded or ill patients).

Not a bad definition if you are a Doctor in a MASH unit getting ready to patch up wounded soldiers, but I want to talk about freeze damaged plants.

David's definition of **triage**: (in horticultural use) the assignment of degrees of urgency to damage to decide the order of treatment of a large number of plants.

#### LEVELS OF DAMAGE

Dead – Its compost pile bound. Better start looking for a replacement.

Severe damage – If it is rare, clean it up, remove the damaged parts, and hope for a pup sometime in the future. Otherwise, see level 1.

Minor damage – Clean it up, remove damaged parts, and move it to the hospital area for a little TLC. No visible damage – It was lucky. Put it back where you found it and treat it normally.

I usually wait a week or two before I start the **triage** process. A plant that looks fine the morning after the big chill, can be ghostly white and totally dead at a later date. I keep the plants watered, even the ones that look dead, and sort them out later.

Odd things can happen when a cold snap hits. Two plants that are pups from the same mother plant, setting side by side can have two very different outcomes. One can be severely injured, while the other shows little or no damage. Survival sometimes comes down to a matter of inches.

As a rule of thumb in the Whipkey greenhouses, the closer the plant is to the floor, the better its chance of survival. One house was built on a 5 inch concrete slab. It is amazing how much heat that much mass can hold. The other house has a dirt floor, but the floor is covered with black lava rock. Another good example of a floor staying warm.

Another position that enhanced a plants chance of survival was if it was under something. Plants can act like freeze cloth. A pot of *Aechmea pectinata* had two pups still attached to the truncated stem of an old mother plant. The pup on the left was under a large *Alcantarea* the one on the right was not covered by anything. Care to guess which one survived? Of course you can, the one on the left suffered little damage, and the one on the right was dead. Sometimes life comes down to a matter of inches.

I am not going to go into a great amount of detail about the **triage** process. I am sure that John's "Show and Tell" will have plenty of graphic pictures that we can discuss at the March meeting.






