July Meeting Topic: Bolivian Travelog

Our July speaker, Scott Sandel, rejoined the BSH recently, after having been a member when he was a kid in the 1970's. Scott grew up in Dickinson and spent most of this childhood on the bayou. He started growing bromeliads that were giveaways, and since they were easily propagated, he became hooked on the Bromeliad family. After graduating from Texas A & M. Scott and his husband Jim moved to San Diego in 1985 where he grows a lot of broms in his modest-size yard. And what do you grow when space is limited? Maybe cute Tillandsias and mini Neo's? Yes, he has a few. Rather, he has a keen interest in growing big, bold Vrieseas and Alcantareas! It seems to work, and they are crammed in there in their frost-free garden. At our July meeting, Scott will give a traveloguestyle slide show on a May, 2019 trip they made to Bolivia. Like Peru, its neighbor to the north, Bolivia is a land of multiple habitats – including coastal deserts, the high Andes Mountains, inland foothills and valleys, and finally the eastern jungles, which drain into the mighty Amazon River basin. The slideshow will show many different habitats and will introduce you to some of the area's archaeology as well.

Outlier



A few months ago I was reading an interesting article about the average life expectancy of an American male. Lately I have developed an interest in such things. Many years ago, I taught mathematics, but I got lost trying to follow all of their calculations. All I basically understood was that the life span of the average American male at birth is about 79 years and that living past the age of 100 makes him an **outlier**. Let's make **outlier** our word of the month.

In mathematics, an **outlier** is a number that is at least 2 standard deviations away from the mean. I hear the yawns from the masses. Let's put it another way. An outlier is something that is completely different in some aspect from all other members of its group.

Archimedes of Syracuse is an **outlier** among scientists. He died about 212 BC, and he is still highly respected. Babe Ruth is an **outlier** among baseball players. He consistently makes everyone's list of the top ten best baseball players of all time.

Let's look at some of the **outliers** in the Bromeliad family. Here is my list, feel free to add or subtract as you see fit.

Odd balls of the Bromeliad family

Ananas 'Comosus' – the pineapple is the only widely eaten Bromeliad. The edible plants

are considered cultivars instead of a species as they are of domesticated origin. I have heard that some eat other Bromeliads, but I don't think it is widely practiced.

- *Pitcairnia feliciana* the only Bromeliad found in Africa. In fact, the only Bromeliad found outside the Americas. From the pictures that I have seen it, it looks much like Johnson grass with pretty red flowers.
- *Pitcairnia tabuliformis* does not look like Johnson grass to me. It has a wide rosette of broad, light green leaves. (Remember *Cryptanthus warasii*? Most of us never thought it fit in with the other Cryptanthus, well, now we know why, it is a *Forzzaea*.)
- Dyckia brevifolia occurs exclusively in patches on rocky banks of the Itajaí-Açu **River** in southern Brazil. It spends much time high and dry, but frequently is cover by flood waters for extended periods of time.
- *Tillandsia purpurea* grows in the desert areas of Peru. In some areas there is no soil, only stones and pebbles. You have to look in the history books to see when it last rained. *T. purpurea* not only exists as the only form of life, but it also thrives. The mists at night provide water for these plants. (Science-Fiction Musings About Some Tillandsias by Dr. George Milstein The Bromeliad Society Bulletin Volume XVI # 1)
- Puya raimondii it is the world's largest bromeliad. It grows high in the Andes mountains (not as far as I know in Houston). When it is in bloom, it is over 30 feet tall.
- Brocchinia hechtioides, Brocchinia reducta and Catopsis berteroniana are carnivorous. They are the only three bromeliads that are specifically adapted to trapping insects and using them for nourishment. When the soil is nutrient poor, eat bugs.
- Neoregelia cruenta while not a true halophyte, it is darn close. It grows in full sun on rocks and in the sand on the seashore in Southern Brazil.

Bet you wondered why I didn't mention a smallest Bromeliad. Well, all are members of the *Tillandsia* subgenus Diaphoranthema are small. Some examples are:

Tillandsia usneoides, Spanish moss, is a contender as its leaves are very thin, but long and few in number.

Tillandsia recurvata, ball moss, it has multiple short leaves, but, they are rather thick. *Tillandsia crocata* has multiple short leaves, but is smaller than *recurvata*?

See my problem? To be truthful, I could not decide how to define small. Do you look at the width, the height, the size of the leaf, the number of leaves, or even the weight of the plant? I can't decide. I will leave that decision up to you.




