Dennis Cathcart, traveler extraordinaire!



Meeting Date:

Third Tuesday, October 17th, 2023 at 7:00pm (ZOOM login/social time at 6:30 p.m.)

Meeting Place: Metropolitan Multi-Service Center 1475 West Gray St., Houston, TX 77019 and on ZOOM.

Program Presenter: Dennis Cathcart is a lifelong naturalist with a deep interest in reptiles, amphibians, and plants. In 1976, following a decade of work in herpetology, he founded Tropiflora, LLC, a bromeliad and tropical plant nursery in Sarasota, Florida. An avid plant explorer, he

and his wife Linda made frequent expeditions to many countries in Central and South America and the Caribbean. Later, they expanded their travels to Africa, Madagascar, and Southeast Asia. Their travels led to the discovery of many species new to science and horticulture. Hundreds of specimens they contributed reside in various herbariums and botanical gardens worldwide.

Tropiflora supplied the anchor collection for the world-famous Gardens by the Bay in Singapore. In a five-year span, they shipped three hundred fifty thousand plants by airfreight to Singapore. They made a series of trips to help with their care and installation. Dennis is a frequent speaker. He has presented at venues in the U.S., Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand, Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, Venezuela, Brazil, and the Bahamas. These days he and Linda are (mostly) retired from the nursery business. These days, their daughter Robin and son Scott manage Tropiflora. Now a full-time, published writer, natural history remains Dennis' first interest. He and Linda continue to explore exotic lands far and near, maintaining the life of adventure they love.

Dennis will bring his book, Koulèv: Adventures of an American Snake Hunter, Book One and Book Two, to sell and sign. There are three printed versions of both volumes, all will be available:



Cultural Tips: October 2023

FROM RICK AND CAROLE RICHTMYER

Odean Head's Cultural Tips article for January 2010 entitled "Winterizing" is especially relevant at this time of year. We have only slightly modified his article and updated the opening remarks. Our Texas weather is proving once again how unpredictable it can be. We have just barely ended our all-time record setting temperatures for any month in August and record setting September temperatures with little or no rain. It was brutally hot and limited our ability to work with our plants outside. The neighborhoods have lost many trees and shrubs reminding us of the summer of 2011. Now that October is here we have finally had some refreshing rain and our first cold from has come thru. Winter will be here soon so we need to begin preparations.



Some of the conditions that require more consideration in the winter are: temperature, crowding, lighting, watering, air circulation, pests and fungus. Some of the preventatives that we will discuss will certainly apply to more than one of the listed conditions. You may have others to add.

Temperature – Most of our bromeliads will tolerate lower temperatures without damage than we realize. Some will even take a few hours of freezing if the temperatures have been lowering gradually over a period of time. Sudden large drops in temperature can be more damaging. Cold slows down plant growth but with the high costs of heating I can wait a little longer to mature plants. Some plants are more cold hardy than others.

Crowding – Overcrowding can be a real problem. It reduces the precious light and air movement that the plants need. It also makes individual plants more difficult

to observe when checking for stress. Any insect problems will be magnified. Crowding can be reduced by adding more space or making better use of what we have. It may be too late to add space so let's look at the latter option. We can use our space better by growing on multiple layers. This can be done with shelves at other levels, including overhead. We can also install poles and put rings at multiple levels. Growing at multiple levels presents a trade-off. It provides better air circulation but reduces light, especially at the lower levels. It does accommodate more plants. This is a good time to cull (dirty word). We could leave some less desirable plants outside as well as those we have an abundance of (these kinds will probably survive anyway). Large pups on mother plants can be removed or left on the parent plant which has had its leaves trimmed to reduce space. I prefer not to take pups at this time unless they are from special plants that I want to propagate.

Lighting – Crowding into our limited space also reduces the availability of good light. If additional space is not a viable option, we need to decide how to best utilize the light we have. As a general rule I like to give first consideration to my best plants and those that are reaching their prime rather than those that are already past prime.

Watering – Watering is more difficult when the plants are crowded but is required less frequently. How frequent will depend on temperatures. Maybe once a week when it is warm to hot and only once every two weeks or more when temperatures are cool to cold. I grow drier and never fertilize in the winter in an effort of prevent leggy growth. Remember also that the plants do not like to stay wet so it is best to water in the morning and give the plants a chance to dry before night.

Air Circulation – Bromeliads need good air circulation and we should provide some additional fans for air movement during these crowded times. Placement of plants by size can help in reducing crowded conditions. We also have occasional warm days during the winter causing extreme heat buildup in our closed structures. We need doors and windows or panels that we can easily open and close to reduce the heat on those days. Without some added air circulation this heat and light combination can cause burning on plant leaves.

Pests – Most of us grow at least a part of our collection outdoors so we will be taking plants into a crowded area. Before taking plants in, we need to check for scale and mealy bugs. If only a few plants are infected, isolate and treat them. If the problem is more widespread, we need to treat the whole collection. Otherwise, under crowded conditions a little problem can become a big one. When treating a few plants, a contact insecticide such as Safer Soap or plain soapy water can be effective. We need to use a systemic when treating large numbers.

Fungus – Fungus problems, just like pest problems, will multiply faster in crowded conditions. Before crowding, we need to check closely to see if there is any evidence of fungus on a plant. It is in the form of a dark, circular, moist spot that enlarges and expands through the inner leaves of the plant. This plant should be destroyed or in the case of a special plant, isolated and treated. I strip off all of the infected leaves and if there is enough plant left, wash it well and treat it with a fungicide. I am sure that there are fungicides that are acceptable for use on bromeliads.
